

We continue to build our partnerships to best serve those turning to Network annually.



And we’re not done yet. As we shift to a culture of continuous improvement, we are evolving what **greater than** means for our neighbors and our mission moving forward.


Network is **greater than** because of you and your investment in our neighbors and mission. Thank you for your support, and I look forward to continuing to build upon our **greater than**.

OUR NEIGHBORS ARE > THEIR CHALLENGES





COMMUNITY > ISOLATION

When Connie got a flyer for Network's Senior Day, she was curious. She wanted to check it out, but there was a problem— she couldn't drive. For many seniors, lack of transportation is an issue that leads to **isolation**. However, Connie was not going to give up!

When Connie met Charlotte at a Bingo event at her senior living facility, she knew she'd made a fast friend. She learned that Charlotte came to Network to shop for food in the Community Market, and she encouraged Charlotte to attend Senior Day with her.

The next Thursday, Charlotte drove Connie to Network bright and early for Senior Day! They played games with other seniors, enjoyed a hot meal, and shopped in Network's Community Food Market afterward. When they returned home, Charlotte asked, "**Same time next week?**"

Now, Connie and Charlotte attend Senior Day each week. They also play games and spend time together outside of Network. Like many of our neighbors, Network provided these two with more than just food and fun— they found **community**.

PERSISTENCE > HARDSHIP

Lana came to Texas as a single mother, working hard to make a better life for herself and her young son. She was working nights to make ends meet while she worked toward getting a degree in education. However, when her son experienced a traumatic incident, **she had to take time off to focus on her family.**

Lana had enough money saved up to afford a month of not working, but when she went to look for jobs, she had trouble finding success. In her time of **hardship**, she turned to Network for help.

In addition to utilizing Network's Community Food Market and Clothing Closet to save money, Lana started meeting with Network's Stabilization Coaches. After Network paid one month's rent to ensure that Lana wouldn't lose her housing and could afford other necessities, **the Coaches worked with Lana to help her reach her goal of financial stability.**

Working with a coach, Lana updated her resume and practiced her interviewing skills. Before long, Lana started working as a substitute teacher in Richardson ISD.

Lana was thrilled because the new schedule allowed her to participate in her son's healing process and provided her with valuable work experience in her field. She quickly settled into her role as a substitute teacher. As people witnessed Lana's exceptional teaching skills, **she began receiving multiple job offers.**

Lana was offered a position teaching third grade, which she gladly accepted. Now, she no longer needs Network's services and is able to provide for her family. Lana shows the **persistence** that our neighbors show when they come to Network and how our services can help them work toward an improved quality of life.

DIGNITY > DISCOMFORT

Lindsay was a single mother who was struggling to make ends meet. When she went to pick up her children from school, she saw Network's Mobile Market and learned about the services we provide.

Shortly after, Lindsay brought her family to visit Network and sign up to receive services. She was grateful to be able to save on her grocery bill by shopping in Network's Community Market, and she was also eager to explore the Clothing Closet.

She stopped by the Clothing Closet and was excited to select several items for both her and her children. Having access to new clothing helped her children feel **more confident** in school, and she could save the money she would have spent on new clothing to help with other expenses.

“The Clothing Closet allowed me to shop for a coat for my girls to keep them warm in the winter. It lets me send them to school with clothing that fits right and doesn't have any holes. It helps them feel like everybody else.” — Lindsay

SUPPORT > HUNGER

After spending some time in retirement, April knew that she wanted to return to the classroom. She taught for 38 years on three different continents, and she simply knew that she couldn't give up her passion for educating.

April came to Richardson ISD and was hired as a teacher in the In School Suspension program at a local junior high school. She knew that her students would be facing many challenges- including **hunger**- and she wanted to make a difference to help ensure that they could continue their educational journey. She wanted to be able to provide snacks to nourish their brains and reward behavioral improvement.

However, with the recent rise in the cost of living, April was spending more than \$100 each month on snacks for her class. She wanted to ensure that no student went hungry, but she didn't want to break the bank. That's when she heard about Network's Educator's Pantry.

April visited Network and got to shop for snacks that she could provide for her students. When she went back into her classroom, having these snacks available for the students made a big difference.

"It's hard to make good choices when you're hungry. It's hard to focus when you're not sure if you'll get to eat today. Having snacks available frees up a little space in the student's mind so that they can focus on what's going on here."

April shared information about the program with the other teachers at her school, and now they ride together to pick up snacks and **support** their students.

State Farm has long been a supporter of Network's mission through giving and volunteerism. During the pandemic, COVID policies had restricted what was possible for large groups that wanted to come in and volunteer. This year however, State Farm brought in 162 individuals who donated 443.8 hours of their time to volunteering at Network. This is the equivalent of \$12,426.40. Up and Coming

Did you know?

- In Texas, 3.3 million adults have a diagnosed mental health condition.
- 55% of adults with mental health conditions do not or cannot receive treatment.

Due to this proven need for mental health services in our community, this fall Network took big steps to launch compassionate and evidence-based mental health and wellness services. Our programming includes:

- The addition of 2 mental health professionals... A *Qualified Mental Health Professional- QMHP* to serve as our Clinical Case Manager and a *Licensed Master Social Worker- LMSW* to provide individualized therapy for our neighbors free of charge.
- Depression Screenings and Anxiety Screenings and a Self Sufficiency Survey for all incoming neighbors to help Network better understand and address their needs.
- Parent Cafés- to provide support groups for any/all neighbors that need additional community and social connection.

Many of our neighbors cannot afford mental health care, let alone counseling. These services, which Network offers at no cost for as long as the neighbor needs, provide a space to heal and grow in a safe and supportive environment.

A special thanks to the City of Richardson and the Ruth Ann Marmion Charitable Fund for making the launch of this program possible.



Network's Clinical Case Manager, Ashley, is a Qualified Mental Health Professional. She meets with neighbors, assess their needs, and determines the best way that Network can assist them.

Holly, Network's Licensed Master Social Worker, provides free, individualized therapy to our neighbors. She can assist with a variety of issues and help our neighbors work toward stability.







Network of Community Ministries (Network), founded in 1985 is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit with a service area that encompasses the entirety of the 14 zip codes within RISD, including the portion of these zip codes that extended to Plano, Garland, and Dallas ISD areas. During an economic downturn, several churches and community organizations came together to form an alliance to assist families throughout trying times, and thus the term "Network" of Community Ministries was born. Today, Network is a non-denominational, community based organization that has impacted the lives of more than 425,000 individuals since 1985. Network helps community members to regain stability and provides access to strong programs that lead to self-sufficiency. Its mission is "to care, coach, and empower our neighbors in need as they seek an improved quality of life."
